- The world-class beaches of Provincetown include Race Point and Herring Cove were protected by President John F. Kennedy as the National Seashore in 1961.
- Eugene O'Neill wrote Anna Christie and The Hairy Ape in a Dune Shack in Provincetown
- O'Neill's first play, Bound East for Cardiff, was performed in 1916 on a wharf in Provincetown Harbor.
- Pulitzer Prize winner Susan Glaspell and husband George Cram "Jig" Cook were amongst the founders of the world renowned Provincetown Players.
- The National Register of Historic Places has named eight buildings and two districts: the Provincetown Historic District and Dune Shacks which are part of the National Seashore.
- John Waters has written all of his books and many of his movies in Provincetown.
